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TRUSTEES REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2015

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30 September 2015.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Trust's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

The Trust was established by a trust deed dated 23 August 2012.

The Trustees who served during the year were: Mr David Brown Mr Barry Evans Mrs Ann Evans Mr Rodney Stokes

Future trustees shall be appointed by the founder or upon the written consent of the founder, by resolution of the trustees.

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Trust Is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Objectives and activities

The Trust's objects are to advance under the law of England and Wales such exclusively charitable purposes as benefit persons residing in developing countries.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the Trust should undertake.

Achievements and performance

The activities of the Trust have been mainly concerned with projects in Nepal and the major earthquakes in Nepal in April and June this year could have caused major damage to completed projects. Mercifully there was only minor cosmetic damage to some of the projects and following inspection there was no damage at all in most cases.

Steps were taken to protect the children temporarily housed in rented accommodation in Kathmandu, pending the completion of Charlotte's Haven on Earth, to be housed in a boarding house 200 miles away from the earthquake affected area. They were accompanied by a male and female teacher to ensure that their education was continued. On returning to Kathmandu when it was deemed to be safe the children received counseiling for the stress that they suffered.

Subsequent to the earthquakes, there has been much political and social unrest in Nepal with strikes and the resultant shortage of goods and materials. The closure of the border with India makes the importation of goods very difficult.

TRUSTEES REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2015

COMPLETED PROJECTS

Prior to the earthquake the following projects have been completed:-

The building of Shree Siksha Secondary School, Tello Harakpur, Bayarban-1, Morang District.

PROJECTS PENDING

Provision of 4wd all terrain ambulance.

The ambulance funded by the Trust for use by the Chutari Yuva Club has not yet been delivered due to problems created by the Indian border blockade.

Charlotte's Haven on Earth

Prior to the earthquakes considerable progress had been made in the construction of the building and the structure had been completed and the services connected. The earthquake caused an external panel of brickwork to collapse but there was no damage to the reinforced concrete structure. Despite all the difficulties subsequent to the earthquake, work has continued and the building is expected to be completed and occupied by the children by January 2016. The Trust applicable the efforts of the builder, the engineer and Major Lilbahadur Gurung and the local committee of Charlotte's Haven on Earth on achieving this completion date during such difficult times.

APPROVED AND COMPLETED PROJECTS

Maiaria Nets

The Trust purchased through REMIT malaria nets at a cost of £3,000

Supporting the Inner Wheel Club of Nantwich for Mother and Baby Support in Ethlopia

The Trust provided £320 to the Inner Wheel Club of Nantwich for the purchase of yarn to knit shawls, hats and cardigans for mothers and babies in Ethiopia.

CONTINUING PROJECTS

Microloans via Care International

This has proved a very successful project and the Trust made an additional sum of £1,000 available to a wide range of sustenance entrepreneurs throughout the world.

This activity has been left in the competent hands of Rod Stokes who reports to his fellow trustees at meetings of the Trust.

CONCLUSION

The earthquakes in Nepal will have a profound effect on the future activities of the Trust. More schools and village facilities will require rebuilding and more orphans have been created. Obviously larger organisations and the major charities will shoulder most of the cost but the Trust will rely on our local representatives to identify needy projects in the outlying and less accessible areas.

Whilst the Trust is confident that funding will continue to be provided by Mrs Ann Evans it will look to appointing some new Trustees who have possible access to additional funds.

In its operation there are no direct costs borne by the Trust in sourcing and monitoring projects and administration costs are kept to a minimum.

TRUSTEES REPORT (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2015

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

It is the policy of the Trustees to keep reserves to a minimal level. They are aware that the principal donor, Mrs A C Evans, would normally provide any necessary funds for the Trust if requests for grants from relevant institutions were approved by the Trustees.
